Ray Green has taught at a variety of schools in both the UK and in Auckland, including Liston College, St Kentigern College, ACG and most recently at Pakuranga College, where amongst other roles, he was Head of Faculty for Languages, as well as leader of professional learning.

Sancta Maria is the fourth Catholic school that Ray has taught at. "I am delighted to be working at this special college, and have been really enthused by the drive and positivity that permeates the culture here. In the UK my teacher training was in Catholic Education, and I have spent more than half of my twenty-year career in

Catholic schools. It is great to be back where I feel I belong."

One of Ray's roles at Sancta Maria includes overseeing professional learning. "It is a privilege to build on the solid foundation of previous years. There is a high level of expertise through the whole teaching staff, and it is great that we have opportunities to collaborate and share that expertise with each other. We feel we are on a journey to ensure the students of Sancta Maria enjoy the best possible learning experience and we are fully committed to that journey."

Outside of school, Ray is married with two teenage children and enjoys running, football, cooking and walking the family dog.

STAFF PROFESSIONAL LEARNING 2016

During 2016 teachers will continue to participate in professional learning on a fortnightly basis. This continues the same cycle as previous years and takes place from 8.20 am until 9.40 am every second Thursday.

We will notify you of the dates for terms 3-4 in due course. All students are encouraged to remain off site until 9:30 am

However, if this is not an option due to family commitments and your children must be dropped off, while most staff are engaged in PD the alternative for your children are:

Year 7 and 8 will be placed in activities supervised by senior students and prefect leaders Year 9-13 will be placed in silent study rooms in AU1-AU6

Support staff have been arranged to circulate in these areas.

Unfortunately we have not been able to secure dedicated school buses to cater for this late start; students will need to make use of public transport. All school buses will run as normal.

Staff will be engaged in intensive professional learning that has a high quality impact on student learning and outcomes over the course of the year. We are confident that this professional learning will result in teachers being better able to meet the learning needs of your sons and daughters. Our great results are testimony to the success of this approach.

We do realise this may create an inconvenience for some parents, but we are convinced the benefits for students significantly outweigh any inconvenience. Our decision, supported by the Board of Trustees, to run such sessions fortnightly is a balance between providing thorough professional learning for teachers while minimising disruption for parents. Most secondary schools have dedicated time for their teaching staff to come together for such collaboration and inquiry. We appreciate your ongoing support with this initiative.

PARENT INFORMATION



Cyberbullying is bullying. It's using the internet, a mobile phone or other technology like a digital camera to hurt somebody, harass or embarrass them.



What can Parents do?

NetSafe have created a dedicated cyberbullying website which offers practical guidance for young people, parents and caregivers and teachers and principals who want help to understand and deal with bullying that takes place in cyberspace.

Netsafe advice for parents:

- If a child tells you they've been cyberbullied **reassure them that they've done the right thing to trust you** with the problem.
- If the bullying online or on a mobile phone involves physical threats, contact the police. Making threats of harm is criminal behaviour in New Zealand.
- Save evidence of all bullying messages and images. You can save messages on a mobile phone or log dates and times of messages and take screenshots of bullying on websites or instant messenger (IM) chats. This may be used later if you report the bullying to school or the police.
- Bring in any evidence you have when you meet with the police (messages stored on a phone or print outs of screenshots). If you are worried about your immediate safety contact the Police.
- **Reassure your child that you will not remove their technology** as a knee-jerk reaction to problems (including cyberbullying). Young people tell NetSafe that fear of losing access to their computer or mobile phone is one of the reasons why they often don't tell adults.

Cyberbullying at school

If you think the person bullying your child is at your child's school, tell the Principal or a Deputy Principal as soon as possible. **Email <u>nobully@sanctamaria.school.nz</u>**

Cyberbullying on websites or mobile phones

Report internet cyberbullying to the website where the bullying took place - usually there is a "Report Abuse" button or "Safety" link.

If bullying messages are coming through to a mobile, contact your phone company. Report the abuse to the network and ask them to take action. The company should be able to trace the source of the messages and warn the bully that they may lose their number and/or access to the network if they continue.


