#### Kāhui Ako (Communities of Learning)

The Board recently approved our school to join with our contributing schools (St Marks, Sancta Maria Catholic Primary, Our Lady Star of the Sea), Elim Christian College and Kingsgate Christian Primary School as a Kāhui Ako In Action. The intended purpose of schools working together in this way, is to help raise achievement by:

- improving teaching practice
- enabling teachers to work together and benefit from each other's knowledge and experience
- helping all children benefit from the skills and knowledge of great teachers from across a group of schools/early learning services
- helping schools work together so it is easier for children to transition through the education system pathway.

We know that the most important influence on student achievement and progress is the effectiveness of teaching. The evidence tells us that there is a difference between experienced and expert teachers and that some teaching practices have a higher probability of being successful in promoting learning than others. One way of addressing the challenge of variability is to shift the system and organisational focus to collaborative expertise and student progression.





In collaborative cultures, responsibility for the success of all students is shared among all members of the community. Provision of the necessary support, time and resources enables teachers to work collaboratively to diagnose students' learning needs, determine what they need to focus on, plan effective programmes and teaching interventions and evaluate how successful these are in promoting achievement across the learning pathway.

The process takes time and, if done well, provides a sound foundation from which Kāhui Ako can begin to work collaboratively to build an infrastructure, theory of improvement and operating principles to support high quality teaching practices and improved achievement. We have been meeting on a regular basis with Ministry of Education support to progress the establishment of our Kāhui Ako and are in the development stage.

#### CAREERS EXPO AND NCEA INFORMATION MEETING

I encourage students and parents of **Year 11-13 students** to put **5**<sup>th</sup> **April** in your diaries to attend the Bi-Annual Careers Event at **6.30 pm to 8.30 pm in the Auditorium**. At this event, will be a wide range of delegates from Universities, Industry Training Organisations, Private Training Enterprises and other Employee Organisations. Collating information for courses is an important part of preparing students for transitioning on from Sancta Maria College when they leave. Being informed will enable wise decisions and choices for that next step.

There will be a session for those interested in finding out more about NCEA. This is the calendar event that was initially planned for 29th March and has been moved to 5<sup>th</sup> April.

Speed of vehicles has been contributing to the traffic issues.

Do not focus on what you have lost. Learn to give thanks for what you have!









## SPECIAL CHARACTER

## Tanya Murray - Counties Manukau Sportswoman of the Year

Tanya was the most worthy recipient of this award, training for over 16 hours a week, varying from early morning strength training and conditioning sessions to spending evenings at throwing and fitness trainings. With barely any time to spare during the weekdays, she tops this all off with either competitions during the weekend or more training sessions.



Only finding out she was nominated a few days before the night of the ceremony, it took a while for the whole idea to dawn on her. With anxiety taking over, wondering who the other nominees were for both Junior Coach of the Year and the Under 16 Sportswoman of the Year, Tanya had an Oscars-type moment, with the presenter initially calling out the wrong name and, realising their mistake, creating a moment of slight awkwardness. Tanya walked slowly to the stage, not fully realising what she had just achieved. With this amazing success, Tanya was also gifted a brand-new javelin to replace the old, worn out one she had been using, by her undoubtedly proud coach.

This is just the beginning for this superstar. Her short-term goal for this year is to conquer the 40 metre barrier that has been evading her due to the change in her technique one month ago. #### STUDENT ENQUIRIES FOR OUR SPORTS PROGRAMME

We've seen a tremendous increase in the number of students who are participating in sport at our school this year. The biggest movers so far have been in basketball (+70 students), badminton (+56) and tennis (+43) compared to our 2016 numbers. We do anticipate a small drop off throughout the season due to student schedules and academic demands becoming a challenge for some, but these are incredibly encouraging signs for our sports programme.




