Kahui Ako (Communities of Learning)

Since the Ministry of Education approved our Kahui Ako comprising of Our Lady Star of the Sea, St Marks, Sancta Maria Primary Catholic School, Sancta Maria College, Elim Christian College (Junior and Senior) and Kingsgate Christian Primary School, Pukekohe, school leaders have been meeting on a regular basis to discuss, plan and make decisions about the several phases of development for working together on shared goals and achievement challenges that will best serve the students in our communities

based on the particular needs of the young people. We have begun to develop a shared vision, protocols and ways of working. In doing so, we are developing effective relationships which will support our ongoing work.

Ka Hikitia (Accelerating Success)

A group of staff have come together to form the Leadership Team that will have a particular focus on making explicit to others how identity, language and culture are integrated into what we do as important contributors to educational success. We recently hosted a visit from the Cairns Diocese, Australia to plan towards the visit from several school principals in Northern Queensland later in the year to observe effective classroom practices and engage with staff and students.

Senior Leaders from Mary McKillop, Canberra also visited our college to engage with us on the place of 'Student Voice'. Student voice enables students to make a valuable contribution that will inform decisions, planning and leadership as well as provides feedback to the teacher about their learning. It is very powerful and is integral to making continuous school improvement.

GUIDANCE NEWS

It seems we are returning to the days when parents had more say in what their children and teenagers were doing in their spare time. Research across all demographics is showing that careful parenting and improved supervision is occurring in response to the threats present in modern life.

One of these threats is the current fad for challenging programmes and games that target young people and seem designed to threaten and shock. We have written to you about the Netflix programme, *Thirteen Reasons Why*, and now we are aware of two games that encourage young people to self-harm.

A consultation group of older students has been formed at school and they are providing us with a young person's view of these events. Their comments on *Thirteen Reasons Why* included the observation that parents don't really know what is going on in the world of their adolescent children and the students feel it is good to let parents know about some of the pressures they face. These same students might be reluctant to talk at home about their concerns but the lesson is that they really do want to be understood.

We are aware of a game called Blue Whale, for older adolescents, and now there is one for younger children that encourages them to self-harm and to do dangerous things like turn on the gas in their homes. This one is called Fire Fairy and has been presented to look like a programme called "Winx Club". We are advised by the Police that these have appeared in other countries but not yet in New Zealand as far as they know. One wonders who the creators of these pernicious games are.

Again our advice is to form the habit early of chatting to your children after school so they have multiple opportunities to bring up difficult issues. In addition it is essential to be part of their on-line world from an early age so they accept your authority in this matter. It is not enough to "tell" your children not to access the games. Once it is on their phone it is apparently difficult to delete. The game is presented as a series of challenges. It issues a series of directives to take more and more destructive actions, ending in the directive to compete suicide, with Blue Whale, or to turn on the gas in your home, in the case of Fire Fairy.

I know from working with children and adolescents that if they are told to do something they most often do it. They find it hard to resist a challenge, as we do ourselves. We now need to teach them to stop whenever anything is unusual and seek the advice of an adult. To this end we need to make ourselves user-friendly. They need to know that there will be no punishments or negative consequences if they tell. It is more important that we know what is going on in their lives.

games each. Those students were Francisco Siasoco, Gustav Schlusaz, Kohan Paterson and Adam Martis.


