Financial Contributions : 2016

At Sancta Maria College we strive to provide a high quality Catholic education to our students together with a wide range of options and opportunities that fall outside the curriculum and add enormously to college experience.

I am writing to advise that the Board has been informed that the level of financial contributions from the parent community has fallen behind to a point where we are seriously concerned the impact that this will have on the teaching and learning at Sancta Maria College. To date we have only received 69% of the parent financial contributions budgeted.

The Board of Trustees set a budget each year based on the funding received from both the Ministry of Education and Locally Raised Funds which includes parent financial contributions. As you can see on the graph attached, the operational grant provided by the Ministry of Education only covers 59% of the costs of running the College. We have to rely on income from overseas fee paying students and the parent community paying all of their financial contribution to meet the remaining costs of operating the college.

The full outline structure of the financial contributions are sent out at the start of the year with your financial contribution statement. ***The different components of the Parent Contributions are as follows:***

| Attendance Dues: | Collected on behalf of the Diocese to service loans for the capital costs of all Catholic Schools in Auckland : <i>non tax deductible</i> |
| Special Character: | Collected on behalf of the Diocese to fund services to schools that are provided by the Catholic Education Services to ensure that the Catholic special character is maintained at the highest level : <i>tax deductible</i> |
| Capital Contributions: | This is the parent's contribution sent to the Diocese to cover the on-going future development of Sancta Maria College. For example the recent revamping of the drama rooms and music recording studios: <i>tax deductible</i> |
| School Financial Contribution: | This covers a wide range of resources within the College including text books, sports and music equipment (recent grand piano) school magazine, ID cards, additional curriculum equipment and materials such as computers and electronic devices for students: <i>tax deductible</i> |
| Subject & Activity fees: | These relate to specific course and co-curricular activities (sports and music) that are outside the core compulsory curriculum. We incur direct costs for external services and supplies which we must pass on to students who choose to participate in these activities. |

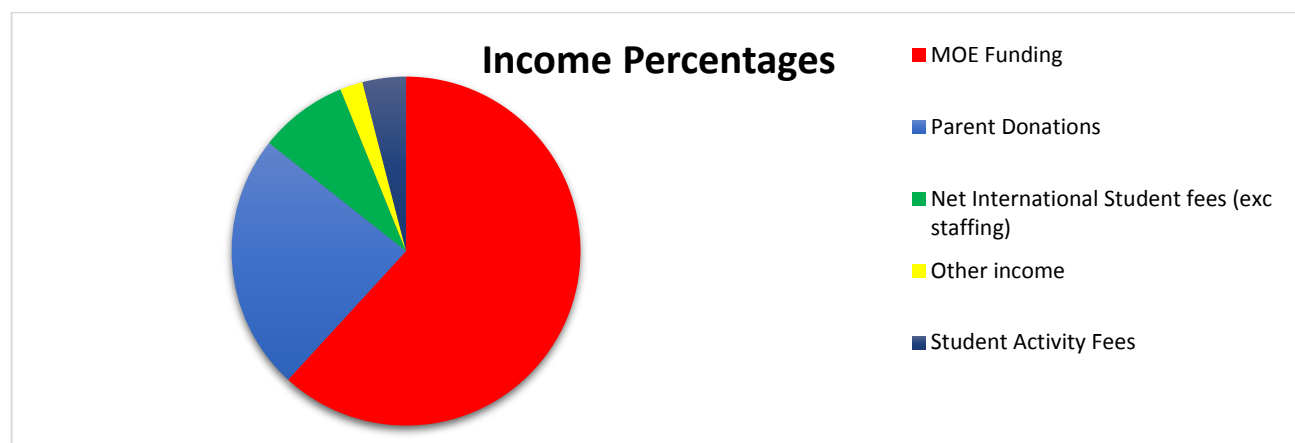

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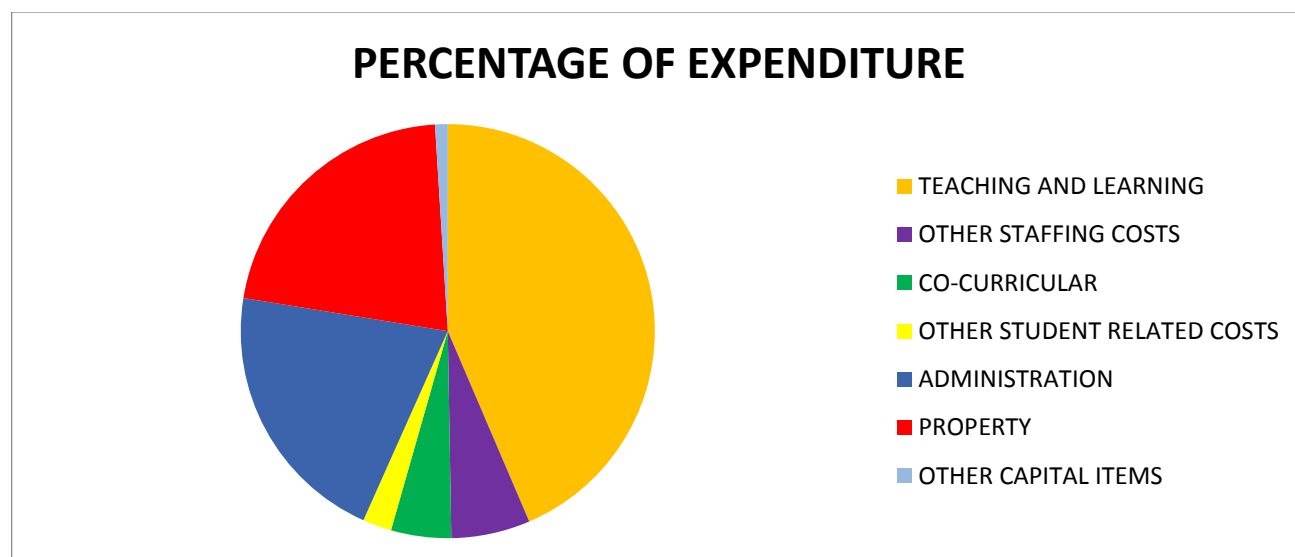

Thanksgiving Mass Recognises Student And Teacher Contributions

Today was a celebration and thanksgiving, yet also a day of tearful farewells for the Year 13s as they left to begin their study leave. It also saw the school candle pass from our head boy and girl to our two youngest students, to be held safely until our opening Mass of 2017.

It was also a thanksgiving for the contribution to the College made by Mr Kevin Saunders, who has recently retired from his position as Religious Education teacher.



Today's Thanksgiving Mass was a special occasion commemorating the achievements of our Year 13 leavers over their years at the College. As part of their final year, the class of 2016 wrote a new College prayer, which was read for the first time at the Mass.

During the Mass the College also recognised the unwavering commitment and dedication of Mr Saunders towards not only teaching Religious Education but also the growth of the special character of Sancta Maria College, his passion for the Peer Support programme, his editorship of the annual College Year Book, and most importantly, the News Centre team. These will not be forgotten. And while Mr Saunders leaves his teaching role he hopes to maintain a working connection with the College through continuing to be involved in some of the above programmes.

Victoria inspired to be a ‘servant leader’

During the Term 3 holidays I was honoured to be a part of the World Vision Senior Scholarship programme of 2016 along with 30 other students from all over the country. I met extraordinary people who inspired me immensely.

On day 1 we discussed the Syrian Refugee Crisis. Among them 1.6 million people are displaced and in Lebanon, 1 in 4 are refugees. We talked projects to help these issues in the world, specifically E-WASH, which is to benefit the people in Syria as water is essential for the “sustained well-being of children within families and communities, especially the most vulnerable”.

I heard many inspiring stories of how this project has improved the health of those within the village. We also heard World Vision’s approach/role- humanitarian imperative, to help those who need assistance. For example after Nepal’s earthquake, World Vision’s priority was emergency shelter, health, nutrition, water, sanitation, food, child protection, education and hygiene. Due to advocacy being an important part of promotion for justice, we were educated about giving a voice to the world’s most vulnerable.

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Day 2 consisted of guest speakers voicing the answer as to how we are able to help the people who live under extreme poverty and what we, as a generation, can do to restore human dignity - we must take ownership and have righteous anger because poverty is not okay.

A former refugee came in to speak to us, his stories were frightful and terrifying. He was 18 years old at the time and lived on a 45 foot boat, with 2 pregnant ladies, 2 children and about 20 passengers. This situation was the biggest challenge he faced because he had to stay alive for 46 days, with minimal food and a single bag of clothes.

We also discussed why Syria is in conflict and what we could do about the impact of colonisation. War is uncontrollable as rules do not apply, Syrians live with constant fear and it's exhausting. Consequently, war makes people numb on the surface - but beneath everything people are so angry at the injustice of the world and your heart is broken with grief. Even surviving war can affect someone, this is also known as survivor's guilt.

Around 1:30pm we were fortunate enough to visit a refugee camp in Auckland. This experience will definitely be engraved on my mind because when I met these children, they were all so happy and vibrant. I learnt a lot from them and felt extremely honoured to be in contact with these amazing children who deserve a lot more. As part of a small group we played hand games and hung out with these beautiful boys and girls.

Day 3, was a day about leadership, to establish what kind of leader we are and how we can use this to our advantage. All of us have a heart for justice and so we are all change makers. I came out as the servant type of leader, along with the activist, the visionary and the reformer.

Steve is the founder of The Breakfast Club. He stated that if we want to do something for those who aren't as fortunate as us, we can, we just need to start today! Bonnie was the founder of Indigo & Iris and motivated me to do what I'm passionate about, to serve others who need my help. What's your dream for your school in 2017?

I want to motivate more students to do something, to increase the participation rate with World Vision in Sancta Maria College, while raising as much money as possible to help those in Syria. When there are fundraisers, I hope to use the new advocacy skills I've learnt and promote this cause in 2017, so it will be another successful year for the 40 hour famine.

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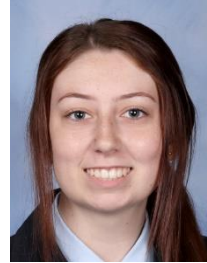

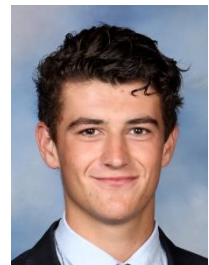

Study Link

Students Planning To Go To Tertiary Study After They Leave School Should Apply For Their Student Allowance Or Loan By 16 December.

StudyLink expects around 180,000 students to apply for their Student Allowance or Loan for the 2017 academic year.

Applying by 16 December means StudyLink can get everything sorted so that the student receives their funding from the start of their course. Students don't need to have their NCEA results or have locked down all their plans in order to apply.



Their application can be updated as things are confirmed. It's more important to allow enough time for all the steps in the application process to be completed.
