FROM THE BOARD CHAIR AND PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Caregivers and Whanau

The Education Review Office (ERO) Team has now completed its review of our college and a verbal reporting back on the emerging findings has been given to The Board of Trustees and Senior Leadership Team. It was noted that the many positive strengths that were identified in the previous review (2012) continue to remain evident throughout this review.



The overall evaluation question being asked was **"How effectively is this** school's curriculum promoting student learning, engagement, progress and achievement?"

Discussions, documentation and observations took into account our specific context and unique characteristics. Reference was made to staff changes in the leadership team since the last review and the sad passing of one of these staff.

The college can be proud of its academic record and is already exceeding the 2017 government targets of 85% NCEA (Level 2) and is on track to achieving the Ministry of Education National Standards Goals for reading, writing and math. There were many other positives and included the supportive culture and positive relationships that exist, the high expectations for behaviour and academic endeavour underpinned by the school's charism that is at the core of all work. The Pastoral Care systems continue to enhance the holistic support provided for our students.

The review is about striving for continuous improvement and there is very good guidance provided of how to achieve this.

We wish to acknowledge the efforts of the Senior Leadership Team and staff for the work achieved as part of the preparation towards the review and their active participation in it. Many students were also interviewed and the ERO Team commented positively about our students and their well- considered and constructive responses that were given. Our thanks to you all.



Special Character Review

Sister Sian has completed the Special Character Review and has made a verbal statement to The Board. She has commented positively about Special Character which permeates every area of the college. Similar to the ERO visit, Sister Sian sited documentation, made observations in the classroom, interviewed students, staff, parents, The Special Character Committee comprising of parent proprietor's representatives, The Senior Leadership Team and The Board of Trustees.

ON SITE PHYSIOTHERAPY SERVICES

This would minimise the amount of time that students would be away from school attending these physio sessions. We are pleased to advise, that after negotiations with a local physiotherapist (BodyZone Physiotheraphy), we are launching this service at the College. These sessions will be on a Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 11.00am - 2.30pm in the Wellbeing Clinic which is situated in the Auditorium.

Please note:

- Please check with your child when they need to be in class doing assessments BEFORE making an appointment.
- All bookings and correspondence is to be made direct with BodyZone Physiotherapy: Phone: 535 0006.
- Sancta Maria College is providing facilities only for the services and does not accept any liability: this rests with BodyZone Physiotherapy based at Les Mills, Howick.

The services will commence on Monday, 31st August.



GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT - PARENTS AND COUNSELLING

While students have the right to access confidential counselling in the College, this can sometimes be difficult for parents to accept. They might worry that private information about their family is discussed or that a counsellor is captured by a story which could be one-sided.

Sancta Maria College prides itself on supporting families. Reflecting this, the counsellors are keen to do all they can to support healthy family relationships. They are too well qualified and experienced to be captured by a biased account of events and will work towards helping students to resolve any difficulties in their relationships with their families, if family issues are being discussed. This often means a parent is invited in to work with their child, if the child will agree to such an arrangement. This is the best way to dispel any lingering doubts or misunderstandings about the counsellor and his/her role. Outcomes for parent and child are almost always good.

Most students self-refer and most come about school concerns and friendship issues. These are usually resolved. One family issue that is sad and avoidable is the issue of neglect. Students who have been left alone for long periods of time in childhood do seem to have a struggle as they grow up. There is nothing like the reassuring presence of their own parent or parents, even when they seem to be coping well.

Having open access to a confidential counsellor in school is probably one of the most important aspects of safety for students, as they are able to talk to someone about the things that worry them before they become too serious.

Year 11 Art Students Visit

The Wallace Art Trust at the Pah Homestead, Hillsborough.



Sir James Wallace began collecting New Zealand art in the mid-1960s, with a particular focus on the work of emerging artists. In 1992 he transferred his Collection to a newly formed Charitable Trust, which he proceeded to fund so that it could continue to add to the Collection and provide support for the arts in New Zealand in general.

At this present time The James Wallace Arts Trust is proud to present two exhibitions, Woollaston: The Wallace Arts Trust Collection, 1931 – 1996 and Medal Artists of New

Zealand – Regroup Reflect Regenerate. The exhibition Woollaston is a remarkable collection of works by Sir Mountford Tosswill Woollaston. Born in rural Taranaki in 1910, long and famous resident in the Nelson district, knighted in 1979 for services to the arts, Toss Woollaston was the veteran of the longest, toughest and best-fought battle for recognition ever won by a New Zealand painter against the resistance of an ambivalent Kiwi public. From the early 1930s he led the struggle to gain acceptance for modern art in New Zealand, and through his life and work inspired generations of new artists to follow his example.

Regroup Reflect Regenerate looks to the past, present and future of this impressive group of artists through a comprehensive display featuring 35 exhibitors and over 200 medals.

"Medallic art is an art for lovers of sculpture on a small scale; art in the palm of your hand. The primary function of the medal has always been to be a bearer of messages, communicated intimately by the artist to the public." L.Tilanus, FIDEM, 1998

Sancta Maria College Year 11 Art students visited this exciting venue with an emphasis on the outdoor sculptures and the medal exhibition. They were greeted by an educational officer who guided them through the exhibits by using engaging questions and activities. One activity involved the students having to form a debate as to why their selected art work had more meaning and worth over another art work. Students demonstrated enthusiasm for the challenges that they were set and responded with insight and integrity. They also enjoyed the beautiful building and grounds in which the work is exhibited.

LOST LIBRARY BOOKS

Many families will have received invoices recently requesting payment for lost library books.

When a student has an overdue book for more than a term, we presume it is lost and ask the cashier to send an invoice so that we can replace it. This is our action of last resort. Your student will have received reminder notices via their Home Room teacher and may also have been reminded verbally by the library staff.

If you receive an invoice for lost books, please check with your student whether the books are still in their possession. Often they are under beds or being read by siblings. If books are returned in good condition, we will cancel those charges. If a book is lost, please organize payment with the cashier so that those funds can be used to replace the item.

Please encourage your students to take responsibility for misplaced books so that other students are not disadvantaged. Returning property promptly is a good habit to encourage. Senior students should know that universities can prevent students from graduating when they have unresolved library loans/debts.

40 HOUR FAMINE 2015 A Report Back - TAKE A STAND Join the fight against hunger now and change the world!

On Friday 13 March 2015 a group of senior students attended World Vision's Global Leadership Conventions: 40 Hour Famine Symposium. The students were given the opportunity to learn about global issues, empower them to become inspiring leaders and take action. The event embraced innovative ways of learning about inequalities and global hunger. This year, students were asked, "What do we see the world as...' and 'What do you stand for?"
