College Sport

The winter sports programme is well underway and I wish to acknowledge and thank all those volunteers who are supporting a code this season. We wish all our teams competing a successful season.

We have recently compared our 2016 Participation Sports Data with 2017 and are pleased to inform you that there has been an increase in student participation in general, staff and teachers involved in sport and school representatives. Of the 15 codes students are involved in there has been an overall increase in 13 of those sports codes offered. This is promising and shows the positive shift that has occurred since 2016.

Other progress includes further engagement with some identified sports organisations and clubs (Marist Eastern (Years 7/8 age), Auckland and University Hockey, ABSL, Auckland Football/Futsal, Auckland Badminton). There has also been increased coaching education made available to students through the 'Growing Coaches' (Basketball) and 'Coach Development Programme' provided through Sport Auckland and Active. Congratulations and thanks to the Sports Department who have worked hard to achieve this.

"The best part of you, is who you are inside".



Debating

However, this year, our team changed that. Danica Loulie-Wijtenburg(Year 11), Julia Tenedero (Year 13) and Elizabeth Leaning (Year 13) made up our team that was negating the topic that "Issues for women in America are not issues for women in New Zealand".

Although the team agreed strongly with the position they'd been given, they were also severely disadvantaged due to the makeup of the team. They would be against Botany's team of Year 13s who compete in the Premier Advanced Grade (one grade above our highest competitor). Nevertheless, the team made strong points about the universality of women's rights, and were given a little bit of an edge by the fact that the opposing team only had one girl in it.



The adjudicators unanimously determined Sancta Maria College as the winners by an extensive margin, securing the Zonta Shield for our school. Nicola Bebelman, a natural at figure skating

Most people like to play the usual sports like netball, basketball or soccer. However, Year 11 student Nicola Bebelman participates in a sport that isn't so popular — Figure skating. Yes it is a sport and in fact is part of the Winter Olympics. Nicola is an exceptionally talented skater and is currently a part of the Auckland Ice Figure Skating Club (AIFSC).

She joined skate school at the age of 10 and when she was 11 years old joined synchronized ice skating which is when there are 8-20 skaters, depending on the level, skating together in a team. They usually move together as one whilst doing different types of footwork. Her teams name is 'Black Ice' and most of them have been skating together for 4 years. Nicola works very hard in order to be at her best and trains not only on Wednesday mornings and Friday nights, but also when everyone else is still sleeping she trains from 6am-8:45am every Saturday.

When training off the ice her team works on lifts, strength and flexibility. It sounds like a gruelling job to get up early to train on the weekend but Nicola has the passion and drive and is definitely reaping the rewards. Just last year she competed in her first overseas competition with her synchro team in Sydney. She has also skated for the opening of the famous 'Disney on Ice' three times.

The main skills in skating include spins, jumps and turns and for solo skating Nicola is currently working on her routine for when competitions begin and on the skills for her next test.


