WHAT IS NCEA?

The national certificate of educational achievement (NCEA) is the main school leaving qualification in New Zealand. Around 150,000 students study each year towards an NCEA qualification.

NCEA was introduced in 2002 and considered a credible and robust qualification in both New Zealand and overseas. It is recognised by employers and tertiary institutions and used by students as a steppingstone into degree level study and employment.

NCEA has 3 levels:

Level 1 - usually completed in year 11

Level 2 - usually completed in year 12

Level 3 - usually completed in year 13

NZQA = New Zealand Qualifications Authority – They oversee the qualification

NCEA = National Certificate of Achievement



HOW DOES NCEA WORK?

Within Levels 1, 2 and 3, your child chooses to study a variety of NCEA subjects offered by Sancta Maria College. These subjects have a range of standards that are used to assess your child's progress. The standard describes what the student needs to know or what they must be able to achieve in that subject.

Each standard is worth credits and students must gain a minimum number of credits to achieve each NCEA level. Credits are earned using a mix of internal and external assessment.

For example:

A **history standard Level 2** might be, "carry out an investigation into a historical event of significance to New Zealanders" = 4 Credits

A **Religious Education standard Level 1** might be "Describe the purpose of a sacred text within a religious education" = 6 Credits



WHAT NCEA GRADES CAN YOU ACHIEVE?

There are two types of standards that contribute to NCEA, and different levels of achievement for each.

Achievement standards

These generally involve studying traditional curriculum subjects and your child gain these with grades of:

- Excellence (an excellent pass)
- Merit (a very good pass)
- Achieved (pass)
- Not Achieved (fail).

Unit Standards

These generally involve studying vocational subjects and your child is awarded unit standards with grades of

- Achieved (pass)
- Not Achieved (fail).

Subject Choices for Seniors

Year 12 - Option choices x 4 (Compulsory RE, Core PE, English,)

Year 13 - Option choices x 5 (Compulsory RE)



NCEA – QUALITY OVER QUANTITY

- **STANDARDS EQUALS CREDITS:** Depending on the difficulty of the standard, each one is allocated a number of credits, usually between 2-5.
- INTERNAL STANDARDS VERSUS EXTERNAL STANDARDS

Internal Standards - (Essays, Assessments, Logs, Speeches, Portfolios)

External Standards – (1-3 hour Exams or portfolios completed in November/December)

70% of Student work is internal assessments therefore work per week 1-2 hours at least 4 nights a week.

The focus is on the *quality* of the credits –
 Merit and Excellence, rather than the final credit total.






NCEA – QUALITY OVER QUANTITY

• A year course most subjects are worth between 16 to 18 credits x 6 subjects = (96-108 Credits) + plus core PE.

University
Entrance
Qualification

- NCEA Level 3 qualification is required (60 Level 3 credits)
- 14 credits at Level 3 from 3 <u>approved subjects</u> Total 42 Credits. (Left over 18/60 credits can come from any University entrance approved subject
- UE Literacy at Level 2 with 10 Credits, available from a variety of subjects 5 credits in reading and 5 credits in writing (This is done in Year 12 English and Religious Education)
- UE Numeracy at level 1 with 10 credits or higher (Done in Year 11)





WHAT DO I NEED TO GO TO UNIVERSITY

- Some degrees have harder entrance requirements and calculate entrance on students Level 3 best 80 credit
 - Guaranteed Entry Score <u>Auckland University</u>
 - 280 = Biomedical Science, 260 = Engineering + Certain standards passed

CALCULATING MY RANK SCORE: How your NCEA rank score is calculated

- Your rank score is based on your best 80 credits at Level 3 or higher over a maximum of five approved subjects.
- These credits are then weighted by awarding points based on the level of achievement Excellence (4 points), Merit (3 points) or Achieved (2 points) attained in each set of credits.

Maximum Rank Score is 80 credits x 4 points = 320 Rank Score THERE IS NO POINT HAVING ALL ACHIEVED CREDITS THAT'S WHY STUDENTS NEED MERIT/EXCELLENCE

A student will receive Scholarship Endorsement for a course if they achieve 14 or more credits at Excellence in a single year.

- 3 of these credits must be from externally assessed standards.
- 3 of these credits must be from internally assessed standards.

- Handing in work that has not been done by you and claiming that it is so, is cheating. Cheating can involve for example; copying another student's work, copying from a book and not acknowledging that it is not your own work, getting undue help from someone else, or taking banned materials into an assessment.


Authenticity is essential.

- You will be asked to sign a document that the work you are handing in is entirely your own.
- Departments may also ask you to provide draft copies, complete tasks in class, reference accurately all sources of information or other methods to prove authenticity.



CHAT GPT / AI TOOLS






Allowed - Examples (Grammaly/Quillbot) Punctuation and Proofreading tool

Not Allowed – Examples (Chat GPT/Snapchat/Bard) – Any tools that when asked a question can write a formal answer when prompted. Students should always create and write their own work.

Any students caught using AI tools to write assessments will be processed for Academic misconduct and risk losing all their credits for that assessment.

This process may be used if you disagree with any decision relating to an assessment.

Further Assessment Opportunity (FAO)

A Further Assessment Opportunity is when your teacher offers you another chance to achieve a standard when you have initially failed to achieve to your potential – you must be able to improve your original grade.

Resubmission (Resub) - If you just fail

- Schools may offer a resubmission opportunity to students only when a minor error prevents them from reaching an 'Achieved' grade.
- The only change in grade boundary available for resubmissions is from 'Not Achieved' to 'Achieved.'
- On this basis, the highest grade that can be awarded as a result of a resubmission of an internal assessment is limited to 'Achieved'.

FAQ:

- 1. What if I'm sick when an assessment is on?
- 2. What if there has been an accident or emergency when an assessment is on?



STEP PROCESS

- Email the Principals Nominee and your teacher immediately.
- Get doctor to provide medical certificate or letter from guardian.
- Complete the Application for <u>Change of Assessment Date</u> (Late, Extension, Missed Assessment)
- Give the completed form to your Teacher who will rearrange another date for the assessment to take place on



There is always work to be done!

How much do you really know about your child's learning?

70% Internal Assessment = 1-2 Hours 4 days a week

- There is no such thing as "no homework" at Year 11,12,13. Your child will always have work to do. – For due dates look at course outlines
- Laptops are essential
- Assessments are now happening al through the year not just in November.


Distractions: Mobile Phones and Part-Time Jobs
